Dear Sacred Heart families and friends,

Last Friday was Census Day for schools. Our Census Day figure was 142 students enrolled at Sacred Heart.

- Schools must submit a Student Enrolment Census twice each year:
 - on the last school day in February, and
 - on the first Friday in August
- Provide student enrolment data to Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools and the Department of Education, Skills and Employment for funding allocation, provisioning, planning and national reporting.

We will now begin the process of planning class structures, program provision and budgets for the 2023 school year. In order for us to be able effectively plan for the 2023 school year, it is essential that you inform the School Office if you will not be attending Sacred Heart in 2023, otherwise we will assume your ongoing enrolment and support.

Sacred Heart's enrolment over the past few years has maintained a steady balance with exiting students in Year 6 and other year levels being balanced by our Prep intake and the enrolment of students in other Year levels.

This year we have been delighted with an increased Foundation enrolment for 2023 and are seriously considering capping this class enrolment and implementing a waiting list for enrolments in Foundation. We have also had a number of enrolments in classes other than Foundation and have been approached to enrol a Ukrainian refugee family.

When Gina or I (or other staff members) take prospective families for school tours, we are often told that they have heard great reports about the school from you, our families. This is always exceptionally pleasing to hear because positive word of mouth is one of the most effective promotional tools that any school can have. In part, this is why we implemented the Community Voice section into the newsletter as an occasional opportunity to hear from you regarding different aspects of the school.

The Melbourne Archdiocese Catholic Schools (MACS) – School Improvement Surveys (MACSSIS) that will be provided to you at the end of this month are another important method of us receiving feedback about our overall performance.

MACSSIS is a set of surveys that have been built specifically for Catholic schools in Melbourne by the Learning Services team at MACS, in partnership with researchers at Learning First and in wide consultation with Principals in Catholic schools. Our community's opinions are critical to understanding how our school is performing – MACSSIS is a key data source for guiding the ongoing work to improve our school..

The Assumption of Mary

The Assumption of Mary is a Holy Day of Obligation (unless the date falls on a Monday) and is celebrated each year on the 15th of August.

It is a day that celebrates the Blessed Virgin Mary being taken up into Heaven, body and soul, at the end of her life. Pope Pius XII declared the doctrine of the Assumption a dogma:

"By the authority of our Lord Jesus Christ, of the Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and by our own authority, we pronounce, declare, and define it to be a divinely revealed dogma: that the Immaculate Mother of God, the every Virgin Mary, having completed the course of her earthly life, was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory."

Mary was assumed into Heaven, which is different to Jesus ascending into Heaven. Jesus went up into Heaven by His own power. Mary, however, was taken up into Heaven by God.

On the Solemnity of the Assumption, we remember the role Mary played in Jesus' life and the role she continues to play as a Mother to us all.

"Mary, give me your Heart: so beautiful, so pure, so immaculate; your Heart so full of love and humility that I may be able to receive Jesus in the Bread of Life and love Him as you love Him and serve Him in the distressing guise of the poor." ~ Saint Mother Teresa

Do you know about the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria?

The First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria is the democratically elected representative body of Victorian Aboriginal people developing the structures for treaties. It was set up by the Victorian Government in December 2019. The Assembly is the voice for Traditional Owners of Country in Victoria and other Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples living in Victoria in the Treaty process with the State.

On Thursday 23rd August, the FIRE carrier leaders will be hosting a meeting with Vicki Ward (MLA for Eltham), the Hon. Gab Williams MP, Minister for Treaty and First Peoples with the FIRE Carriers from the Catholic Primary Schools in the electorate, some members from the Nillumbik Reconciliation Group and the Reconciliation Captains from CLC, to have a conversation with the Minister about Treaty, it's meaning and to ask any questions they may have. We are looking forward to this opportunity to be involved in this significant event.

About the First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria



The First Peoples' Assembly of Victoria is the first body of its kind in Australia.



Established in December 2019, the Assembly is made up of 32 members – all proud Traditional Owners of Country in Victoria.



These Aboriginal leaders were chosen by their communities to represent community views.



Twenty-one representatives were determined by a statewide Aboriginal community vote held between September and October 2019, and 10 representatives were appointed to reserved seats by formally recognised Traditional Owner groups. Yorta Yorta Nation Aboriginal Corporation have not appointed a representative to date.



The Assembly is the voice for Traditional Owners of Country in Victoria and other Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples living in Victoria in the Treaty process with the State.

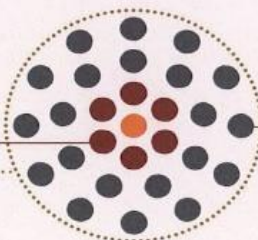
How is the Assembly structured?

Executive

- Nine directors elected by the Assembly members
- Led by Co-Chairs elected by all representatives
- Implements decisions of the Assembly and leads the agenda

Elders' Voice

- Form is to be determined
- Provides cultural strength and advice to the Assembly



Assembly Chamber

(32 members)

- Meets quarterly to make all key Assembly decisions on the Treaty process
- Members responsible for regularly engaging with their communities before each meeting

General seats

(21 seats)

Elected by statewide vote in 2019. All Aboriginal Victorians living in Victoria have the opportunity to vote every three years.

Reserved seats

(currently up to 11 seats)

One representative appointed by each formally recognised Traditional Owner group.


Thank you to Brenda McMahon for organising the Lamont Book Fair for the community. Thank you also to those who were able to purchase books and support the school in doing this.

Wellbeing

THE POWER OF PRAISE

When children receive praise, this leads to an increase in positive feelings, helps motivation and encourages effort to work harder. Receiving regular praise from parents and caregivers also helps young people to develop self-esteem and confidence. Praise can be given verbally, such as "I love how hard you tried in practice today," but can also be given through a range of other gestures such as displaying a happy facial expression, giving a thumbs up, through a hug or with a high five. When children and young people receive this type of positive praise, it can lead to an increased sense of safety, security and love, and encourages healthy development.

We can give praise in two ways: praise for being and praise for doing.

Praise for Being

This type of praise lets a young person know that they are valued for who they are and allows them to feel important. Praise for being validates a young person's existence and lets them know that you love them unconditionally. Examples of this type of praise include

- I love you very much
- I am glad to have you in my life
- You are a great friend to those around you
- I believe in you
- That's a great question
- You did your best, you can always try again.

Praise for Doing

This type of praise focuses on specific behaviours and actions that a young person is doing well. Praise for doing work by stating exactly what a young person did that you liked, which encourages further positive behaviour. When praised for doing, it is important to focus on the effort, rather than the result. This helps young people understand that working hard will help you achieve your goals. Examples of this type of praise include:

- I am proud of how much effort you put into studying today
- I love how well you tried at basketball practice
- Thank you for taking the time to clean your room this afternoon
- It is great how nicely you are playing with your sister.

All people love to receive compliments and praise and it can feel great giving it! Think of whether you are currently praising for being or praising for doing and give out a new complement today.

INSIGHTS

How to change your parenting for the teenage years



Parenting teenagers is traditionally seen as the most difficult parenting stage. However, many parents have discovered that raising teenagers is a lot easier than raising younger children. For this to be the case, there are three changes parents make to survive their kids' adolescence.

Step up the coaching

When kids are young it's common for parents to take over many aspects of their lives. They establish bedtimes, cook meals and make doctor's appointments. Parents decide where they will go to school, if they go to camp and where the family will take a holiday. Children are content with this approach and will enjoy having their days organised by loving adults.

Teenagers, on the other hand, need to start managing their own lives, which can put them at odds with over-protective or over-controlling parents. Wise parents will aim for redundancy well before the teenage years so handing over control isn't so foreign.

Psychologists William Stixrud and Ned Johnson, authors of *The self-driven child* believe parents need to hand over a great deal of decision-making to adolescents. Not straight away and not in a way that negates their need to take responsibility for their actions. They advise parents to gradually involve teens in creating rules that govern their own behaviour, keep challenging their choices and provide emotional support when they make poor decisions. A parent gives up being a manager and takes up the role of life coach.

Influence teens differently

Most parents would like to download all their knowledge of the world into their teenage children's brains so that they could always make good decisions. Giving teenagers information doesn't guarantee that you can influence them as you did in childhood. Teenagers are highly attuned to status and hypervigilant to the way they are treated by adults. If you talk down to them, they will turn off as you are talking to the low status or child-like part of the brain. Talk to them as if they are autonomous young adults and they are more likely to listen, as you are talking to the high-status part of their brains. If you wish to discuss topics such as respectful relationships, the use of alcohol or preparing for life after school, avoid talking to them as if they are children. Speak to them as you would to someone with the highest possible status – someone you respect, and they are more likely to engage with you.

Have hard chats

Conversations with preschool and early primary school years are comparatively easy compared to many conversations you have with tweens and teens that revolve around hot topics such as sexuality, school performance and the future. Avoidance of hard chats and the emotional minefields they lead to becomes the easiest option. Teenagers are dealing with some difficult issues, so parents need to create safe opportunities to talk about the hard issues.

parenting * ideas

Christine Carter, author of *The New Adolescence* believes that parents should think beyond having a “big talk” about difficult topics and bring up these topics using short observations and simple questions. She writes, “Even when we have lots to say, it’s more important to give them a chance to speak, and to work out what they are thinking in a low-risk environment.” Practise staying calm despite your discomfort. Welcome it if your kids sense your discomfort as it reveals your human side.

In closing

Young children and teenagers have very different needs. Effective parents adapt their parenting style to meet the developmental and emotional needs of their children at each stage of growing up. Teens need greater autonomy, skilled guidance and plenty of chances to talk about the issues that bother them and worry their parents. That may mean that you need to shift your parenting gears a little to meet their needs in the teenage years.

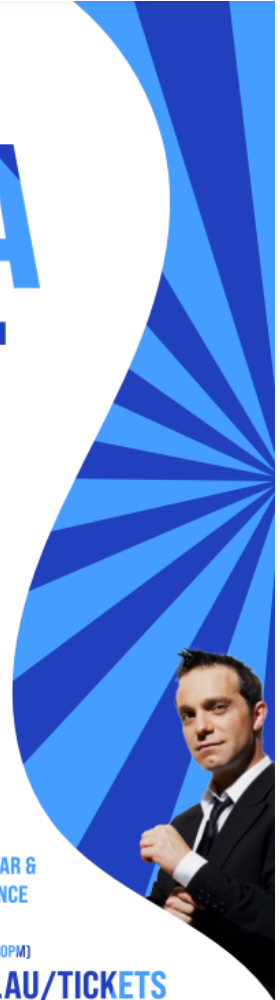
