Dear Sacred Heart families and friends.

The Sacred Heart Primary School uniform is an important symbol of the school's history and story, and it provides a tangible representation of our identity as a Catholic school. There are times when a school reflects on its uniform to ensure it is a proud representation of its identity and a practical one. Currently, we have students wearing either the school jumper or polar fleece jacket as their outer garment with little consistency across the school.

A number of parents have been liaising with Academy Uniforms in regards to new jumper colours and texture. A new navy blue jumper will be introduced to replace the older royal blue jumper. Following discussions at school leadership level and consultation with the School Advisory Council, it has been decided that beginning in Term 1, 2023, all students will be expected to wear a jumper as the outer garment when wearing the school uniform and the polar fleece is to be worn as part of the sports uniform. If children are cold they are able to wear their polar fleece over the top of their school jumper on school uniform days but not as the only outside garment.

There will be a transition between the jumpers of three years and in this time students can wear either the old jumper (royal blue) or the new jumper (navy) as part of the school uniform but not the polar fleece alone. Any promotional materials moving forward will use the new jumper and school photos will be done with no jumper. The new jumpers will retail at the same price we have currently been selling jumpers at: Sizes 6-8 \$60 Size 10 \$65 Size 12 \$67 Size 14 \$70 Size 16 \$72. As we still have a number of the old jumpers available we will sell them at a discounted price of \$40.

The primary reason for this is to maintain more consistency between students and feedback from our parents to ensure there is consistency and a proud representation of the school's identity.

All uniforms can be purchased through our online store and will be placed in tubs. If we do not have sufficient numbers we will order more for the new school year.

Christ Holy God, within us and amongst us, we give thanks in glad remembrance.





This term in STEM the F-2 students have been having a lot of fun with a range of activities focussing on different forces like bouyancy and bending.






















SWIMMING PROGRAM:

The intensive swimming program for Term 4 started on Wednesday with the weather holding off for all groups. The children will need to wear their bathers under their uniform each Wednesday. BUILDING UPDATE - CHANGE TO COMPLETION DATE:

Our building project is rapidly approaching its completion although due to shipping of materials, there has been a slight delay in the completion date. The architects and builders have now advised us that the building works will be delayed by a couple of weeks. Therefore our previously advertised walk throughs will need to be delayed. We will have a formal Opening of this project early in 2023 when all of the external works are completed.

The times and dates for the 'Walk-throughs' this year will be advertised once completion is closer.

RUNNING CLUB:

The running club is on each Friday 8am on the school oval. This is run by one of our Dads, Dale Nardella (Sienna, Jack & Beau). If you would like to attend this please meet on the school oval at 8am.

BEGINNING OF 2023:

To encourage a positive and personal start to the new school year in 2023, we are staggering students' return to school, across all year levels. Students in Years One to Six will be allocated a morning or afternoon session on Monday 30th January or Tuesday 31st January.

During this session, teachers will spend time engaging with their students in a small group setting designed to enhance student wellbeing. These sessions may include time for the teachers and students to engage in various activities including reading, number work, classroom organisation and social and emotional (SEL) activities. We anticipate this personalised opportunity will promote a calm and positive approach for students returning/commencing their 2023 school year.

Students are expected to wear full summer uniforms, including school hats. They are asked to bring a snack, drink bottle and pencil case with them to this session. Students' days and times will be shared with families over the coming weeks.

YEAR LEVEL PARENT REPRESENTATIVES:

In 2023 we are going to continue with a level parent representative or a couple of parent representatives for each level to play an important role in facilitating the continued building of our school community culture, starting from the ground up at class level. Other key aspects of the role include communication between school and parents, parents and school, support for the teacher and class activities.

Activities

Year level representatives may, for example:

- Liaise with the teacher in regards to questions parents may have.
- Organise play dates and class events outside school.
- Help welcome new families.
- Organise meal rosters for families with new babies or going through hardships.
- Request parent help with classroom activities.
- They may be requested to facilitate fundraising activities or enlist volunteers for whole school activities.
- Circulate and promote information regarding fundraising projects and special activity days on behalf of the Teacher.
- Other activities as appropriate.

Helping your young perfectionist



There's a perception in our society that perfectionism is a good thing, akin to 'being perfect..' That it's something we should strive for or drop into conversation in job interviews... Yet the reality is quite different.

Perfectionism leads us to place unreasonably and often unrealistically high expectations on ourselves. Essentially, it causes us to raise the bar so high, that we frequently wind up feeling like failures, consumed by frustration and self-blame.

Of course, this can be very unsettling to witness in our kids and it can be hard for us to know how best to help. It can start when our children are very young and grow with them in intensity and impact. Perhaps you have a young child who refuses to draw because her drawings don't look exactly like those of an adult artist. Or maybe your little guy becomes so distressed by a small mistake in his homework, that he insists on starting all over again in his unhealthy quest for perfection.

If you have older kids, perhaps they refuse to submit an assignment because it's not perfect, or they won't run the cross country because they know they won't win.

While it's great for our kids to hold high expectations of themselves, aiming for perfection actually sets them up to fail. Their habitual 'all or nothing' thinking leads to the unhelpful belief that if they don't achieve 100%, they've as good as flunked. Their focus on their mistakes rather than on their successes often affects their self esteem, fuelling a vicious cycle that can lead to stress, depression and anxiety if left unchecked.

The sooner we help our kids break this unhealthy habit, the better. So let's look at a few tips for doing just that.

Reduce your praise

There are two ways in which we tend to praise children. 'Content praise' often draws attention to the end product, for example, "What a fantastic drawing!", or to a fixed quality in a child, such as "You're so clever". In contrast, 'process praise' focuses on how your child got there. When we use process praise, we draw attention to their good ideas, problem solving approaches, effort, persistence, concentration and enthusiasm.

While it's helpful for all children to experience more process praise than content praise, this is particularly true for children with perfectionistic traits. This allows us to draw the focus away from how impressive the end result might (or should) be and instead highlight the importance of having a go, trying their best and learning along the way.

For example, rather than saying, 'What a fantastic drawing! You're an amazing artist – what were you worried about?', it's more helpful to say something like, 'It's great to see you having a go at drawing. I love watching you try new things'; or, 'I love seeing the ideas you come up with when you draw'.

Of course, most of the time we needn't praise children at all. Saying simply, 'Drawing is fun isn't it?,' is often enough to provide children with that all important sense of connection.

Model making mistakes

At my children's school, they're taught to embrace 'fleaming' – leaming through failure. Admittedly, my children witness me 'fleaming' all the time at home, but in the eyes of your child, you might seem perfect. It's helpful for your kids to see that you make mistakes too, and importantly to learn through your modelling how mistakes can be managed.

Look for (or create!) opportunities to do this. When you're planning on bringing some spoons to the dining table, you could bring knives over instead and say, 'Oops, my mistake. Not to worry. I'll just go back and swap these over.' Or, perhaps you could draw alongside your toddler and deliberately keep from drawing inside the lines, commenting to your little one as you go, 'I love drawing with you'. By doing so, you model for your child that mistakes are okay, that they needn't hamper their enjoyment of a task and importantly, that the end result isn't all that matters.

Teach your child to speak to themselves as a friend

How does your child talk to themselves?

Would they speak to a friend in the same way?

No? Then what might they say instead?

We all know how much our inner voice can affect how we feel. Teach your child to be kind to themselves. To be supportive, forgiving and encouraging, even when they make mistakes.

Consider how you react when your child behaves in an 'imperfect' way

Do you respond calmly when your child accidentally spills cereal all over the kitchen bench or do you tend to overreact? It's important when we're teaching our children that they needn't be perfect, that our responses back this up.

By accepting our children as they are – wonderful, 'good enough' young learners – we teach them to do the same. And that's so much better than perfect.
